



Aboriginal Education

Edgeworth Public School has a large Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Community. Students are involved in different activities each term including a language program, artwork activities, dancing, and mentoring groups. The parents and community are always welcome, in particular we host two yarn ups each year, to discuss plans and ideas for your children. Each year we hold a special assembly to recognise Sorry Day, and NAIDOC Week celebrations are held in Term 2 Week 10.

We have also created a new Yarning Circle which is utilised by all students and teachers. This has mosaic animal designs created at one of our NAIDOC Day celebrations.





Appointments

Parents are always welcome to discuss their child's progress with the classroom teacher, executive or counsellor. We do ask you to make an appointment by telephoning the School Office on 4958 1831. Appointments need to be made around the staff's daily responsibilities and commitments.


Parents are invited to attend a formal interview once a year. This is an opportunity to discuss your child's performance, application, behaviour and general development. Additional interviews can be arranged at other times by making an appointment.

Assemblies

Whole school assemblies are held at 2pm every second week. This is to allow children to keep up to date with school events and receive awards. Parents/carers are welcome to attend our whole school assemblies.

Attendance

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.



Children are required by law to attend school each day the school is open.



On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide the school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence.

Class rolls are marked daily, first thing in the morning. If your child is marked absent an SMS is sent. Please reply to the SMS with a clear explanation of the absence.

Late arrivals and early departures are registered as a partial absence. Students arriving late need to be accompanied by a parent/carer, report to the office and obtain a slip that is then handed to the class teacher. Parents/carers of students who need to leave early are to report to the office and their child will be called to the office to meet their parent/carer.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why. Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

In the best interests of the school, we request parents/carers to keep sick and recuperating children at home until they are well enough to be able to participate in their normal lessons.

Bicycles, Scooters & Skateboards

Canteen

Our canteen is run by the Parents & Citizens Committee and operates 5 days a week. We follow the Fresh Tastes NSW Healthy School Canteen Strategy which is a mandatory implementation procedure of the Nutrition in Schools Policy. The canteen is operated by a Canteen Supervisor (Jenny Hampton) and volunteer workers.

Without parental support the canteen cannot operate and volunteers are always needed to help the canteen run smoothly each day. If you can assist please contact Jenny on 4958 1831. No experience necessary. Lunch, tea, coffee and good company are all provided.

How the canteen works:

- A canteen price list is available on our school website.
- All orders must clearly have the following information on them name, class, whether the order is for recess (R) or lunch (L), what they have chosen and the amount in total.
- Orders can be placed by either:
 - Writing on a lunch bag and placing together with money at the canteen window before 9:10 am.
 - Ordering can be done Via the Quick Cliq App
 - Order cut off time is 9:15am.



Change of Details

Please advise the school immediately if there is a change of address, phone number or emergency contacts. By doing this, our records are kept up to date. These are very important in cases of emergency or sickness.

Addressing questions and Concerns

- We are committed to working with parents, carers, families and students to ensure all students are happy and thrive at school. If you have a question, issue, complaint, feedback or compliment, we'd like to know.
 - Most problems can be solved by talking to the people who best know your child, your child's teacher. If an issue cannot be resolved, we recommend setting up an appointment with the Stage Assistant Principal. If further follow up is needed, arrangements can be made to meet with either the Deputy Principal or Principal.





A child in K-6 typically spends 80 per cent of their time in a 9:10 am to 3:10 pm, five-day school week learning from the syllabus.

The remaining 20 per cent of school time is spent on activities at the school's discretion. This could include languages, additional school sport, concert rehearsals, religious education and special projects.

English and Mathematics contributes up to about 50 per cent of the school week – this is equivalent to at least 12 hours each week. Other subjects are spread across the remaining time. In considering meaningful learning within local contexts, teachers will make decisions about the sequence, the emphasis to be given to particular areas of content, and any adjustments required based on the needs, interests and abilities of their students. The compulsory curriculum for all Department of Education is divided up into 7 Key learning Areas.

Intergrated Units

At Edgeworth Public School we incorporate student voice and interest based learning to explore these KLAs in an integrated way. We refer to this as 'Integrated Units' which generally begin with a Launch Day to excite and engage students in the learning to proceed throughout the term.

Curriculum Reform

The New South Wales government announced the curriculum review in 2018– the first comprehensive review of The NSW primary and secondary curriculum since 1989. The aim being, to update and rework the NSW curriculum so that students can continue to contribute to Australian society in the 21st century.

Parents and carers took part of the review through consultation and their input helped to form the final recommendations of the review.

In 2022, Edgeworth Public School K-2 teachers engaged in the new K-2 English and Mathematics syllabuses to teach, assess and report. From 2023 implementation of the new K-2 English and Mathematics syllabuses are mandatory in all NSW schools.

In 2023, Edgeworth Public School engaged with aspects of the new 3-6 English and mathematics syllabuses to identify and plan for changes.


In 2024, all students K-6 will engage in the new English and Mathematics syllabuses. At Edgeworth Public School we are committed to implementing these syllabuses through the DoE sample units of work to ensure best practice is maintained through this transition. Each teacher contextualises the units of work to meet the needs of all learners in their classroom.

Curriculum

Assessment

Teachers expertly draw on a range of rich assessment task strategies to monitor and track individual student progress, inform future directions for student learning and provide ongoing feedback to students. By embedding strategies throughout the teaching and learning cycle, teachers ensure that assessment practices are linked to learning experienced by students. Effective assessment practices are responsive and result in changes to teacher practice, based on student need. Edgeworth Public School will assess students and report to parents on student achievements in a variety of ways. We aim to focus on developing positive attitudes, confidence and independence as well as academic and social progress. A range of formative and summative assessment strategies will be applied and become the basis for informing our teaching practice and reporting to parents. At Edgeworth Public School, teachers refer to a Stage-based Assessment Schedule to collect information about students English and Mathematics progress.







Decodable Texts

In line with the new K-2 English syllabus requirements, Edgeworth Public School has made a significant investment in decodable texts for both classroom instruction and home reading.

The new K-2 syllabus states that:

"Across a year of learning, teachers must give students daily opportunities:

- To be read to: Being read to supports children in acquiring new vocabulary from a text, gives students access to texts beyond their immediate means and supports the development of reading as pleasure. Independent reading should not supplant being read to. Where reading aloud is not accessible for students, they should be read to using their preferred communication form(s).
- To read decodable texts: Decodable texts support beginning readers to use decoding strategies and practise their developing reading skills. Provide decodable texts for beginning readers in Early Stage 1, and as needed for students in Stage 1 and beyond.
- For wide reading: Once students can consistently use phonic knowledge to decode words, the use of decodable texts does not need to continue. At this point, students should be reading a wide range of texts of increasing complexity and varied topics.

• For wide writing: Students need to practise and experiment with creating written texts in English and all other learning areas. Specific opportunities for writing may be found in texts being read, or in other experiences that can provide real contexts, audiences and purposes.

Decodable texts are specifically written for beginning readers as they are developing their blending and segmenting skills and their knowledge of the alphabetic code. Decodable texts support students as they practise by using a continuous meaningful text.

Home Reading

At Edgeworth Public School we promote and celebrate a love of reading at home and school through our K-6 home reading initiative. Each day that your child reads at home they earn 'reading dollars'. At the end of the year, students will be able to spend their 'reading dollars' at the school book shop. Students can purchase items such as bookmarks, pencils, rubbers, books and vouchers.





Counsellor

The services of a school counsellor are available to assist the school as required. The counsellor's role involves aptitude testing to determine students in need of special assistance, making diagnostic contact with students referred for emotional, behavioural or academic reasons, counselling the students, advising teachers on how to help them and consulting parents. Students with support needs can be referred to the counsellor following a Learning and Support meeting with the parent/carers, class teacher and/or school executive.

Emergencies / Evacuations / Lockdowns

Special procedures exist when emergencies (e.g. fire, earthquake) occur in the school. Children follow either an evacuation or lock down procedure, depending on the emergency.

Practices are held on a regular basis, generally once per semester. The main holding area for an evacuation is the hall. A short drip sound of the school bell (or when the power fails, a hooter sound) signals an emergency, and evacuation procedures are brought into operation. A long whoop sound of the school bell signifies a lock down.

These procedures are displayed in the classrooms, library, canteen, staffroom and offices. Please note that all visitors to the school are expected to follow the appropriate procedures for any drill or emergency. We ask that you become familiar with our policies. Please sign in and out via the QR code, at the front office, when visiting the school.

Enrolment Requirements

Every child is entitled to be enrolled at the government school that is designated for the intake area within which the child's home is situated and that the child is eligible to attend. All children must be in compulsory schooling by their 6th birthday. Children can start Kindergarten at the beginning of the school year if they turn 5 on or before 31 July that year. New enrolments will be asked to attend an interview. This is a good time to share information of any special circumstances, allergies, health or medical conditions, before your child starts school.

You will be asked to provide the following documentation;

- child's birth certificate or identity documents
- proof of child's address totaling 100 points of identification which may include; current council rates notice or residential lease or electricity bill etc. (please refer to the form in the enrolment pack)
- up to date immunisation history statement from the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR)
- any family law or other relevant court orders, if applicable
- if your child has health, disability or other support needs you will need to provide copies of medical/healthcare or emergency action plans
- evidence of any disability and learning and support plans.

Entrances/Exits

There are two entrances/exits to the school on Minmi and Oakville Roads. We ask parents to keep these entrances clear at all times. Access to the school during the day is only available through the Oakville Road. Minmi Road gates are kept locked between 9:30am and 2:30pm

Excursions

Each year excursions are planned for children in all classes to supplement and consolidate work being covered in lessons. The cost for excursions is met by parents. The school has access to limited funds to assist children whose parents/carers may be experiencing financial difficulty at the time. Payment can be made online via School Bytes. EFTPOS facilities are available at school.

The highest standard of behaviour is expected on all excursions.

Fresh Fruit Break

Classes participate in a morning fruit break. This aims to keep energy levels high and causes minimal disruption to learning. Parents/carers are asked to provide a small, pre-cut, peeled, ready to eat piece of fresh fruit or vegetable in a small container. Pre-packaged products cannot be eaten at this time.

High Potential and Gifted Education

The school plans to meet the learning needs of all students including those identified through our high potential and gifted education programs.

All teaching/learning units at Edgeworth Public School have been reviewed and special activities incorporated to extend more able students. Students can access a range of national competitions and extra curricular activities.

Kiss and Ride

Access to the school is via Gates 1 and 3 on Oakville Road.

Kiss and Ride Zones are designated for your convenience and for your child's safety. Designed for quick entry and exit, these zones minimise congestion and risk when used properly by all parents and carers. These zones operate under the same conditions as no parking zones, which means you may stop to drop off or pick up children for a maximum of 2 minutes. You're required to remain in, or within 3 metres of, your vehicle. Days and hours of operation may apply to some zones.

Edgeworth Public School's Kiss and Ride Zone is situated on the Oakville Road entrance to the school.



Key Learning Areas

Six Key Learning Areas (KLA's) make up the primary school curriculum. These are:

- English
- Mathematics
- History and Geography
- Science and Technology
- Creative & Performing Arts
- Personal Development, Health and Physical Education

Learning and Support Teacher

The role of the Learning and Support Teacher (LaST) is to assist students with additional needs and to assist the staff to accommodate these students within the regular classroom. This may include challenges in numeracy and/or literacy. Children can receive support to improve deficits and to enrich and extend skills and content. Students may have behavioural, social, emotional or language and communications needs. The LaST works collaboratively with parents and carers, classroom teachers and executive staff, the school counsellor and outside agencies such as speech therapists or psychologists to best support the child in need.

Library

Our library is a doorway to an exciting world of fun, facts and information. Students can pursue personal and class interests, read, research and view electronic displays of the work of their peers. The library is visited fortnightly by every student in the school. It provides students and teachers with teaching and learning resources from a large range of media types. The library offers a pleasing environment that is conducive to learning.

The library is open at lunchtimes from 1:40pm until the end of lunch. Students may use the library for recreational reading, research, educational board games, computers, construction, returns and borrowing during this time. Student library monitors help the teacher librarian in organisational and borrowing procedures. Classes are timetabled to visit the library each fortnight, so students have the opportunity to borrow and develop a love of reading. Kindergarten, Year 1 and Year 2 students must have a book bag to protect books



Medication and Medical Conditions

For safety reasons students are not to keep medications of any sort in their bags. Non-prescribed medications e.g. throat lozengers, panadol, cough mixture etc. should be administered at home before and after school. These medications should not be sent to school for safety reasons.

When a medical practitioner has prescribed medication such as antibiotics that must be administered during the school day, parents/carers are responsible for:

- bringing this need to the attention of the school, via the office and completing consent forms
- ensuring that information is updated if it changes
- supplying the labelled medication, in a webster pack and any 'consumables' necessary for its administration
- collaborating with the school in working out arrangements for the supply and administration of the prescribed medication

When a child is diagnosed with a serious medical condition eg. anaphylaxis, severe asthma, diabetes etc a Student Health Care Plan is developed in conjunction with parents/carers to support the student in cases of emergency. Please inform the school if your child is suffering from a serious medical condition.

Mobile Phones

Although it is preferred that students in Years 3 to 6 do not bring mobile phones to school, there are times when our older students might need a mobile phone for safety reasons when travelling to and from the school. Students who bring mobile phones to school must place them in their designated storage cabinet at the start of the school day, located in the office and Stage 3 Area. Students will be given a wrist band to identify their phones storage numbers. The cabinets are locked, and students will collect their phones as they are leaving school. Children are NOT permitted to use their phone during school hours.

P&C Association

This is a parent and community body that operates under the umbrella of the Federation of the Parents & Citizens Association. Their role is to represent the needs of the school through the parent body. The school P&C promotes the interest of the school by bringing parents, community members, students and teaching staff closer, working together to raise funds for the school to help provide extra resources and equipment as discussed at P&C meetings. Edgeworth P&C Association is open to everyone and meet twice a term on Monday, Week 4 and 8. Membership is \$2 per year. All parents and community members are welcome to attend. This is a positive and rewarding way to be part of your school community.





Preschool

We believe children's learning is lifelong, where early childhood education is a cornerstone for experimentation, exploration and experiencing, belonging, being and becoming. We embrace the Early Years Learning Framework where play is the 'heartbeat' of our program.

At Edgeworth Public School Preschool we;

- value children, families, staff and community by providing a warm, safe, friendly and welcoming environment where all are respected and supported.
- believe children are unique, capable, strong and powerful protagonists in their own learning.
- acknowledge the significance of inclusive and reciprocal relationships that are crucial for wellbeing and learning, providing a sense of belonging and security.
- embrace diversity and differences which are reflected in our environment, interactions and programs.
- embed sustainable practices to promote a sense of responsibility and empower the future generations.
- create a shared environment of connectedness where we embrace the local culture of the Awabakal people.

Children generally attend Departmental preschool classes for one year only, the year before they start school.

Please Note: If your child is offered an out of zone enrolment at the preschool, this is no guarantee your child will be accepted for Kindergarten as an out of zone student at Edgeworth Public School.

Preschool Hours

Our preschool program operates 1 full-time classroom with two groups of up to 20 children. Current structures:

15 hours a week:

Group 1 attend every Monday and Tuesday from 9.10am to 3.10pm and on alternate Wednesdays from 9.10am to 3.10pm.

Group 2 attend every Thursday and Friday from 9.10am to 3.10pm and on alternate Wednesdays from 9.10am to 3.10pm.







Playground Supervision

Supervision is provided by the teaching staff for half an hour before lessons commence each morning, 8:40am to 9:10am.

The teachers are rostered to supervise children at recess and lunch time. The children who catch buses in the afternoon are also under teacher supervision, as well as those that use Gate 1 and 3 near the Kiss and Ride pick up areas on Oakville Road.

The school day concludes at 3:10pm and supervision ceases at 3:30pm. Children are required to leave school promptly at the end of the school day with the exception of bus lines.



Reports

Students receive formal reports twice a year, at the end of Semester 1 and Semester 2. Edgeworth PS has an assessment and reporting procedures guide, to assist teachers in making consistent judgements about student achievement. Parent/carer interviews are held at the end of Term 1. Parents/carers may meet with teachers at other times by making an appointment at the front office.

Special Religious Education (SRE) and Special Ethics Education (SEE)

Special Religious Education and Special Ethics Education lessons are delivered by scripture teachers from the various Christian denominations. The availability of classes will depend on the number of volunteer teachers. Those who would like to volunteer are asked to contact the office for further information.

School Leaders

Each year students from Year 5 are elected to be School Captains, Vice Captains and Prefects for the following year. They assist with school tasks, lead school events and assemblies, helping the teachers, students and community as leaders across the school community. Leadership opportunities also include; House Captains, Student Representative Council (SRC), Junior Aboriginal Education Consultative Group (AECG), Breakfast Club, Technology Team and Library Monitors.

Student Representative Council (SRC)

School Captains, Prefects, and elected class representatives from Year 3 – Year 6 participate in a student council meeting on a fortnightly basis. The role of the student council is to develop positive attitudes and to practise good citizenship, promote harmonious relations throughout the entire school, improve student relationships, improve school morale and general wellbeing, provide a forum for student expression, plan special events or projects and raise funds to support student needs and charity.

Sickness/First Aid



If a student becomes unwell they report to their class teacher or if they are on the playground, the teacher on duty who will send them to the office. The school will make telephone contact with the parent/carer if it is necessary for the child to go home. The student is kept in the sick bay until arrangements can be made for the child to go home.

Teachers and front office staff will attend to simple needs, e.g. cuts and grazes, but in cases requiring special medical attention, parents/carers or the nominated emergency contacts are notified. In serious cases, if neither parents/carers can be contacted, the child will be taken by ambulance to hospital where contact with the parents/carers and/or the doctor nominated on the enrolment form will be made.

Sport

Sport and PE at Edgeworth Public School involves a K-6 approach, sport is held on a Friday. Students of all abilities are catered for by a system which offers a wide range of sports on both an inter-school (PSSA) and intra-school (House) level. Various gala days and knockout competitions are held throughout the year. Specialist sport instruction is also offered. A comprehensive PE program with an emphasis on fundamental movement skills is taught throughout the school.

Children are allocated to a House for the purpose of competition e.g. sporting activities and carnivals and are allocated their house on enrolment into the school.

School Sports Houses are as follows:

Swimming, Cross Country and Athletics

Skills are programmed in preparation for the school's annual carnivals. These carnivals can lead from local level to state level representative selection in teams organised under the banner of the Primary Schools' Sports Association (PSSA). The Swimming Carnival and Cross-Country running event are held for students aged 8 and over. An Athletics Carnival takes place for all students in Years 1-6 during Term 1 or 2.







Student Wellbeing Procedures

The school wellbeing procedures clearly sets out the expectations that we follow as school members – at school, on excursions, on the school bus, during sporting activities and while travelling to and from school. Should a child's behaviour not be acceptable, the procedures to be followed are clearly set out on the school's website. High expectations and positive behaviour are strongly promoted across our school.

Our school values are explicitly taught and part of our everyday core business!



Reflection Room

Generally, children at Edgeworth PS follow the school wellbeing code, responding appropriately and making wise choices. When a child makes choices that may cause injury or distress to others in the playground, a teacher may refer them to reflection room or to the school executive. Reflection room occurs at lunchtime and may be of one or more days' duration. Our Assistant Principals have responsibility for the Reflection Room. The intent of the Reflection Room is to help the child plan for improved behaviour through discussion and determining better actions. If a visit to the Reflection Room occurs, an executive may make contact by telephone or send an email to parent/carers. In most instances, children do not return to the Reflection Room. If, however, a child does return in a short time frame, additional measures may be put in place. Familes are notified if this occurs.


The school is serviced by 4 bus runs in the morning and in the afternoon. Children in Years K-2 are eligible for free bus travel to and from the school. Primary students who live more than 2km (as the crow flies) from the school may also apply for free transportation to and school. Buses drop off and pick up the children in our bus bay area in the former Hunter Life Education location off Renfrew Crescent. Children must enter the school grounds as soon as they get off the bus. In the afternoons, children are to wait outside the hall under supervision of the teacher on bus duty before being directed by the duty teacher to the bus bay.

Students using buses are expected to behave in a safe and responsible manner. Inappropriate and dangerous behaviour will result in withdrawal from the bus and/or notification that the student will not be able to catch the bus in the future. If your child is catching the school bus for the first time, please notify your child's teacher to ensure they get on the allocated bus safely.







